Adrian Brown studied with Sir Adrian Boult and has conducted many leading British orchestras including the City of Birmingham Symphony, the BBC Symphony, the BBC Scottish Symphony and the London Sinfonietta, as well as the world-renowned St Petersburg Philharmonic and the eminent ensemble Camerata Salzburg.

In 2002, for his outstanding work in this field over 30 years he was given a Classic FM 'Red f Award'. He had a major success conducting the Lithuanian State Symphony Orchestra in Vilnius for 2009 European Capital of Culture Celebrations, performing Berlioz in a concert broadcast nationally, and regularly conducts the Corinthian Chamber Orchestra. In the summer of 2013 he was awarded the 'Making Music' NFMS Lady Hilary Groves Prize for services to Community Music, a much appreciated and admired honour. In 2017 Adrian was awarded the Berlioz Society Medal, previous recipents of which include Sir Colin Davis and Dame Janet Baker, and in 2020 also the Elgar Society Medal.

He has his own Orchestra, the Elgar Sinfonia of London, which was launched in November 2018, and in 2019 he celebrated his 40th season with Bromley Symphony Orchestra; he has been our conductor since 1980.




